


Diana and Richard have, once again, generously offered to supply the drinks so no need to bring a bottle.

#### JULY-MEWPORT PAGMELL VISIT:



Ian has been busy on various projects. One that he has just finished, is pretty amazing.

As lan says on the Web site: "Seven of the historical maps can now be viewed in Google Earth: 1300, 1580, 1796, 1882, 1900, 1925

and 1952.

They are overlaid on the ground surface and are aligned with the satellite photographs. There is a timeline slider control, which allows you to vary the map displayed so you can see how the village has evolved over this period. There is also a transparency control which allows the map to be compared to the current situation as shown on the satellite photo. There are also links to the corresponding pages on the web site, which can be displayed alongside the maps

Its fascinating. Check the instruction on the web site and please play.

Michael Franklin sent an E mail saying how helpful the web site is. He visited St Laud's Church at Sherington the other week and just wanted to say thank you.


