Have you visited the website recently?

As new additions to the website have been a little quiet lately, I thought that I would show some of the information I have been getting

from the web about Sherington. Some of you might know that there is a feature in Google called Google Alerts, this feature will send me an email with a link to the webpage when it comes across a word or phrase that I ask it to look for.

I have now been running this for the last couple of years so I thought it might be interesting to share in the results of this search. I have recently added "Ivester-Lloyd" to my searches and I almost get as many alerts for this as I do for Sherington.

There are a number of products you can buy

in the shops that have the Sherington name, two of these that I get most alerts for is a pine bed sold by Argos, Homebase and the like. There is also a men's sandal from Timberland called Sherington. I have also just started getting notified about a Sherington (was that mean to be a Sherrington) suitcase from the Ford Sherrington company of New South Wales.



I have not yet been notified about a town called Sherington but there are a number of street names that have come through, mainly from America or Australia. The one I like the most is in on the Californian coast, where there is a Sherington Place in Newport

Beach. With the warm weather we have been getting lately, sounds better than the River Ouse, although with the information that comes with these links are about arresting suspicious characters or reporting burglaries, I think I'. am happy staying where I am.

Hands to the Pump! (recent emails)



"John Fairburn b.1783 was a printer and publisher of Minories in the City of London . His wife Susanna was born in Bishops Frome, Herefordshire c. 1804. A marriage between a John Fairburn and Susanna Thomas on 15 Jun 1831 in Sherington which is a feasible date as their first child was born on 21 May 1832 in London."

Currently we have not found any other connection in Sherington for this couple so we are still digging on this one,





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
